#### SOAR Protection for Hillsides

Ventura voters approved Measure P last November. Now voter approval is needed before development occurs on over 9,000 acres of hillside property overlooking the city of Ventura. The countywide SOAR organization partnered with the Ventura Citizens for Hillside Preservation group to support passage of Measure P. In an unprecedented spirit of cooperation for environmental groups, the mailing cost of the Measure P campaign was split between the two groups. ## Simi Valley SOAR Fights Massive Project

# SOAR Phase II

#### Q. What is SOAR Phase Two?

#### A. Fighting obviously inappropriate attempts to change SOAR boundaries.

Our fundamental goal is to stop massive development projects that eat up the precious greenbelt buffers between our cities. Our basic strategy has been implemented - SOAR Phase I has effectively given citizens the right to vote on major development projects.

The SOAR Board will not take a position on every development project that is presented to the voters. We cannot and should not take on this role. We trust the voters to make good decisions about when boundaries should be changed.

However, some projects will blatantly violate even reasonable planning guidelines, have few significant public benefits for voter evaluation and be heavily funded by a developer who appears capable of seriously misleading voters. In those instances, we will allocate whatever resources we can to inform voters of our position. The situation described below in Santa Paula is one such project.

## Monster Adams Canyon Proposal Threatens Ventura County

The Santa Paula SOAR boundary was created to keep development from spreading to the massive Adams canyon area before other more appropriate areas were developed. However, only one short year after SOAR passed in Santa Paula, the developer has launched an expensive campaign to win voter approval to bust the SOAR boundary and sprawl into Adams Canyon.

They have hired a professional public relations firm and set up an office in Santa Paula. They are **asking voters to approve this project in November** before it is reviewed and approved by the city council.

The developer claims they will spend \$1 million to win voter approval to build over 2,000 homes with only a small percentage of land dedicated to open space. In a city with only 15,000 voters, a million dollars will be the most expensive campaign, per voter, in the history of the Ventura County.

The SOAR Board believes we must tenaciously fight this project. The countywide traffic impacts alone will be enormous. We hope you will help us turn back this proposal as we launch our first SOAR Phase II campaign.
